BACKGROUND

Drought in Somalia

At the start of this project, Somalia was suffering a severe drought that widely affected the people, livestock and the environment. With 6.2 million people in need of humanitarian aid (which is approximately half of the country's population) and with 50% of them in urgent need of food assistance, Somalia was being deeply impacted by the crisis. 80% of the livestock had been lost and the remaining 20% were quickly losing their value. Nearly 1 million children were intensely malnourished and almost 200,000 of them needed urgent medical treatments. Internally displaced persons (IDPs) had increased at the rate of 35% country-wide. Water sources had dried up and wells for drinking water vanished. People started to die of hunger, and cholera outbreaks were recorded in several locations, such as Buuhoodle.

ARC Somalia Response

ARC Somalia was one of the few international organizations responding to the droughts in Somalia, using the support of five field offices and over 400 staff on the ground. ARC responded to the areas with the most severe needs and prioritized emergency packages of health treatment, food relief and distribution of potable water to the most affected populations and areas. ARC also implemented long term and drought-impact-reduction activities with the provision of durable solutions to the scarcity of water and health facilities. Between 2016 and 2017, ARC rehabilitated and upgraded 29 strategic water points (both wells and dams) in the most badly affected areas of Sool, Sanaag, Bari, Lower Juba, Banadir and Marodijex regions.

ARC is keen to reach people experiencing vulnerability and to ease suffering throughout the country. Doing so meant operating all over the country, including remote areas. ARC is the only international organization who had a functioning office in Lasanod (Sool region) at the time. During the drought, ARC played a paramount role with lifesaving and sustaining interventions. ARC provided extended emergency health services through mobile clinics in the remote areas and treated more than 100,000 patients in 12 months.

Love Army for Somalia

In the spring of 2017, a group of social media personalities, influencers, and athletes looked at what was happening in Somalia and wanted to do something to help. Uniting under the name Love Army for Somalia, they had a single goal: send an outpouring of love and support to people suffering from drought and famine in Somalia. Within just a few days, they had raised over \$2 million dollars for people in Somalia. Love Army then funded the drought relief project through American Refugee Committee Somalia, using their staff and infrastructure on the ground to urgently implement the project.

Staff and volunteers distributed emergency food packages containing rice, sugar, flour, dates, milk and beans to **more than 13,000 families** alongside **over 6 million liters of clean and potable water** through Love Army funding. In addition, ARC distributed **over 126 tons** of ready-to-use nutritious biscuits for malnourished children and women.

PROJECT PLANNING AND PRINCIPLES

The Drought Relief project’s aim was to reach populations in emergency situations, such as those who had lost their livestock and had their livelihoods destroyed by the drought. To this end, the project targeted pastoralists in southern and eastern regions of the North (Somaliland) and Gedo regions and IDPs in Banadir and lower Juba regions. Distributions were mapped out based in part on field office locations, to provide the best logistical support for the distributions.

Through its years of service in Somalia, ARC has developed a practice of collaborating and coordinating with drought committees, local authorities and administrations as well as drought-affected communities. Doing so has allowed the organization to deliver emergency and humanitarian assistance efficiently and with maximum reach and impact.

ARC coordinated with national/regional drought committees and community committees in selecting beneficiaries. This strategy ensured the selection and targeting of the neediest population to maximize the project’s impact on people’s lives. Engaging with local communities and authorities further smooths the distribution process and accountability of the intervention to the targeted population.

Once the initial foundations of the project were established, Love Army and ARC kicked things off by establishing a set of parameters, criteria and principles to guide the project. Prescribed measures included:

- Choosing and targeting the neediest populations in terms of lack of access to food, water and health services

- Coordination with the government in choosing the site that most required access to food, water and health supplies. The national committee for droughts gave reporting update on the scale and areas that hadn't received any distributions.
- Coordination with the local administration of the selected specific field area and preparing ahead of the number of beneficiaries for a distribution to take into account the need of households in that field area.
- Assure the security clearance for the mission(s), prepare the logistical plan and make sure the transportation of the supply is on site.
- Distribution of supply with the presence and official engagement of the local administrative officials, beneficiaries and ARC to ensure that every household gets their designed share.

PROCUREMENT PROCEDURE

A key consideration for the project was the supply of products for distribution. Products for distribution included water pumps, rice, sugar, flour, cooking oil, milk powder, dates, green beans and drink powder. Additionally, **126 tons of Plumpy'Nut** were purchased by Love Army through the Stiller Foundation for distribution to babies, children and mothers suffering or at risk of malnutrition.

ARC programs use a free and fair competitive process in procurement of goods and services through a procurement committee. This process aims to create the highest value for money, transparency and acquire the best possible deal. With vast knowledge of the complexities of humanitarian procurement, along with widespread networks of suppliers, ARC aimed to procure the highest quality products available in the Somali markets adjacent to areas severely affected by the drought.

After careful considerations and review of various options, suppliers were identified who were ready to meet the terms of ARC and Love Army, jointly. **All food items were purchased from nearest local markets within the regions badly hit by the drought. This approach eased the pace of delivery of the food items to the drought affectees who were in dire need of immediate food assistance. The approach also reduced the time needed to deliver the food aid to the targeted population, saved lives of the most vulnerable segments of the population and injected a much-needed cash flow to the local markets.**

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

At the start of the project, ARC was already operating throughout many areas in Somalia, including remote and hard to reach areas of the country. ARC mapped out food and water distribution in three primary locations based on ARC's field offices. Mogadishu, Kismayo and Hargeisa were the focal points for distributions.

The project spanned multiple distributions of different items at different locations over several months. ARC distributed food packages, water, Plumpy'Nut, farming tools including spades, and agricultural inputs including water pumps and solar lights.

Food and Water Distribution

With Love Army funds, ARC **distributed food packages to over 13,000 households**. Each household received a food package of: Rice 25Kg, Sugar 25Kg, Flour 25Kg, Oil 6 liters, Milk powder 2.5 Kg, Dates 10Kg, Cowpeas 10Kg, Drink Powder 1 kg.

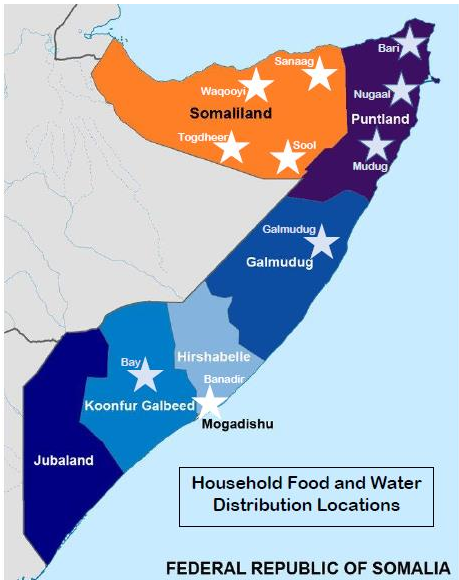

Water truck delivery was also a priority for the project, since the drought had affected water availability for many people. In drought-stricken areas, water sources had dried up, forcing large numbers of people to flee from their villages and seek water and food in distant locations. Scarcity of water was feared to cause people to die of thirst. Emergency water trucking was the most viable life-saving intervention to meet the survival requirements of the people affected. Digging water wells was not an option at the time due to its time consuming nature, involving extensive hydrological surveys to determine ground water potential, land/site identification and immense logistical arrangements that would have delayed the timely delivery of much needed humanitarian assistance. Furthermore, due the dispersed settlements of people displaced by the drought, it would have required many water boreholes to drill.

Over 6 million liters of water were delivered.

Plumpy’Nut Distribution

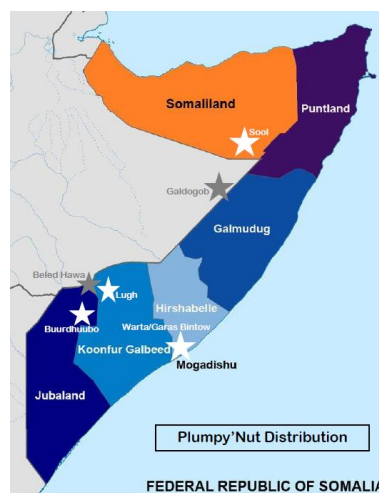
Plumpy’Nut was also a key component in providing relief to families in drought-stricken areas. Plumpy’Nut is a peanut-based treatment for severe acute malnutrition. This food product is highly nutritious and shelf-stable.

Love Army (through the Stiller Foundation) generously donated Plumpy’Nut to ARC. This in-kind donation, valued at **369,426.70 USD**, was in addition to Love Army’s donation of **2,055,963 USD**. Their donation of over **126 tons of Plumpy’Nut** was a vital part of the emergency drought relief project. The donation included several varieties of Plumpy’Nut, which were designed especially for the needs of infants, children and mothers experiencing malnutrition.

ARC teams distributed Plumpy’Nut to **babies, children and mothers suffering or at risk of malnutrition**. Distributions took place in the locations listed below, which were identified as being in serious need of nutritional support.

Agricultural Training and Distributions

Agriculture was heavily impacted by the drought. Farmers lost their livestock and their livelihoods. To help alleviate the impact, ARC took several actions: Working in concert with the Ministry of Agriculture and the Office of the Governor, ARC purchased and distributed necessary farming implements and held agricultural trainings for riverine **farmers in Gobeweyn town, Kismayo, Jubaland**. That area was profoundly affected by the drought.

The Ministry of Agriculture worked to identify farmers in need in that area. Then, ARC utilized its established procurement process to purchase the items and distribute them to the farmers. ARC purchased and distributed **112 water pumps and 94 solar lights** to riverine farmers in Goboweyn. Farming tools were also needed, so ARC purchased **spades, rakes, hoes and mattocks** for farmers.

To complement the distribution of farming inputs and tools, agricultural training was held in Goboweyn. The training was facilitated by technical officers at the Ministry of Agriculture. Combining material aid with training gave farmers the ability to respond to and recover from the drought in a multi-faceted way.

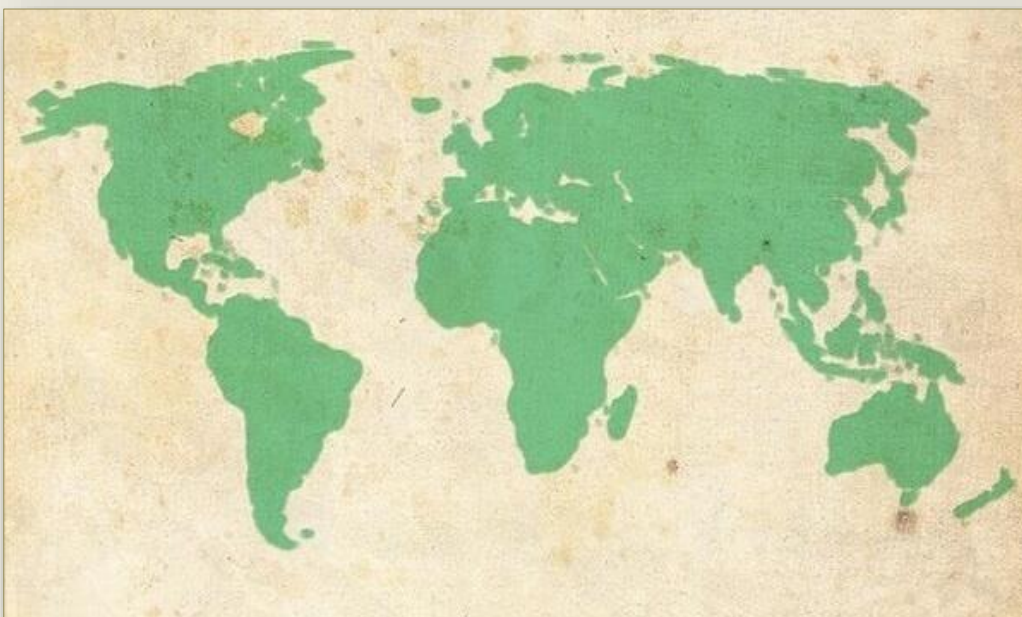

NARRATIVE ON IHH-HUMANITARIAN RELIEF FOUNDATION

IHH- Humanitarian Relief Foundation has been working since 1992 with the purpose to deliver aid to all people who are in need, who had a catastrophe, who are victims of war, natural disaster, etc. or wounded, crippled, starved, homeless and persecuted thereof, wherever they are regardless of their religion, language, race or sect and to prevent the violation of the basic human rights and freedoms of those people. PROJECT SUMMARY

The Rohingya people have faced decades of systematic discrimination, statelessness and targeted violence in Rakhine State, Myanmar. Such persecution has forced Rohingya women, girls, boys and men into Bangladesh for many years, with significant spikes following violent attacks in 1978, 1991-1992, and again in 2016. Yet it was August 2017 that triggered by far the largest and fastest refugee influx into Bangladesh. Since then, an estimated 745,000 Rohingya—including more than 400,000 children—have fled into Cox's Bazar. Now more than one million refugees are residing at Cox's Bazar.

In Myanmar, entire villages were burned to the ground, families were separated and killed, and women and girls were gang raped. Most of the people who escaped were severely traumatized after witnessing unspeakable atrocities. These people found temporary shelter in refugee camps around Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, which is now home to the world's largest refugee camp.

As of March 2019, over 909,000 stateless Rohingya refugees reside in Ukhiya and Teknaf Upazilas. The vast majority live in 34 extremely congested camps, including the largest single site, the Kutupalong-Balukhali Expansion Site, which is host to approximately 626,500 Rohingya refugees.

Around two years into this multifaceted collaborative response, the situation has gradually begun to stabilize. Basic assistance has been provided, living conditions in the camps have improved somewhat and disaster risk mitigation measures have been largely successful. However, despite progress, the Rohingya remain in an extremely precarious situation. The root causes of their plight in Myanmar have not been addressed and their future is yet uncertain. Refugees have access to the basics, such as shelter, food and health care, but they are still extremely vulnerable, living in highly challenging circumstances, exposed to the monsoon elements and dependent on aid.

In order to prevent further physical and psychological negative effects on human lives and to end the sufferings of the affected populations that is deteriorating, 3,250 bamboo houses including landscaping of the area and required foot path and stairs around the houses were established for the most vulnerable Rohingya families who have been forced to leave their houses and take refuge and live in the refugee camps in Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh and the families were also provided with basic required household items and solar energy panels within the scope of this project.

PROJECT FRAMEWORK

Objective

Main objective of the project was to install bamboo houses for 3,250 Rohingya refugee families who had to flee to Bangladesh from Rakhine State of Myanmar in order to find a safe and secure place due to humanitarian crisis in Myanmar.

Objectives of the Project:

- ✓ Provide life-sustaining and life-saving shelter support
- ✓ Contribute towards resilience and cohesion of communities and house-holds by improving housing and community/public infrastructure.

PROJECT BENEFICIARIES

The beneficiary families were selected according to the vulnerability criteria, the priority is given to the widows, elderly, orphans' families and the families of sick and wounded people.

The total beneficiaries from this project are **3,250 families** or **16,250 individuals** with roughly equal gender breakup. All the beneficiaries are persecuted and displaced Rohingya Refugees residing at Cox's Bazar. Each family received a spacious shelter house which will provide secured space to survive a family of five members with safety and dignity.

Indirect Beneficiaries of the Project:

Since the beginning of the project, Rohingya people were hired in the development works. Most of the portion of the project works done by Rohingya people in the field level.

The refugees have been benefitted by this staffing process; 70% works done by the Rohingya refugees and 30% works done by host labours. The number of Rohingya refugees who were hired for the project is 3,250 and the number of local people hired is 1,393 people. Therefore, 3,250 refugees and their families have been also benefited from this project.

IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS

Following steps were taken during the implementation of the Project:

- Needed assessment was conducted in the region
- Selection of the most vulnerable families were conducted
- Required approvals were obtained from the NGO affairs bureau, the Office of the commissioner of Cox's Bazar District and the commissioner of Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commission-RRRC as well as U.N.O in order to execute the project
- Bids documents and items' specifications were prepared for the construction and landscaping materials and and household items.
- Quotations from the suppliers were collected
- A particular committee were composed to ensure the quality and quantity of materials and approval of this committee was received
- The construction and landscaping materials and household items were ordered and received
- The items were dispatched to the identified locations in Cox's Bazar for construction and distribution
- Construction of the houses were completed and clearance certificate for handing over to the beneficiaries were obtained from the Offices of Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commission
- Photo and video coverage was taken during the implementation of the project

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The whole process of the project was monitored by the Asia Desk of IHH and involved in the distributions taking place in refugee camps located in Cox's Bazar along with the local partner organization. IHH was overall responsible for the project, providing strategic support to the planning, implementation, monitoring and reporting within the stipulated time.

The field office of IHH and local partner in Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh has procured the required items in Bangladesh and were responsible for the project implementation in the target area with clearly defined goals, objectives, results, implementing strategy and monitoring mechanisms. The Partnerships Department and Asia Desk of IHH have provided guidance and supervision to the local project team.

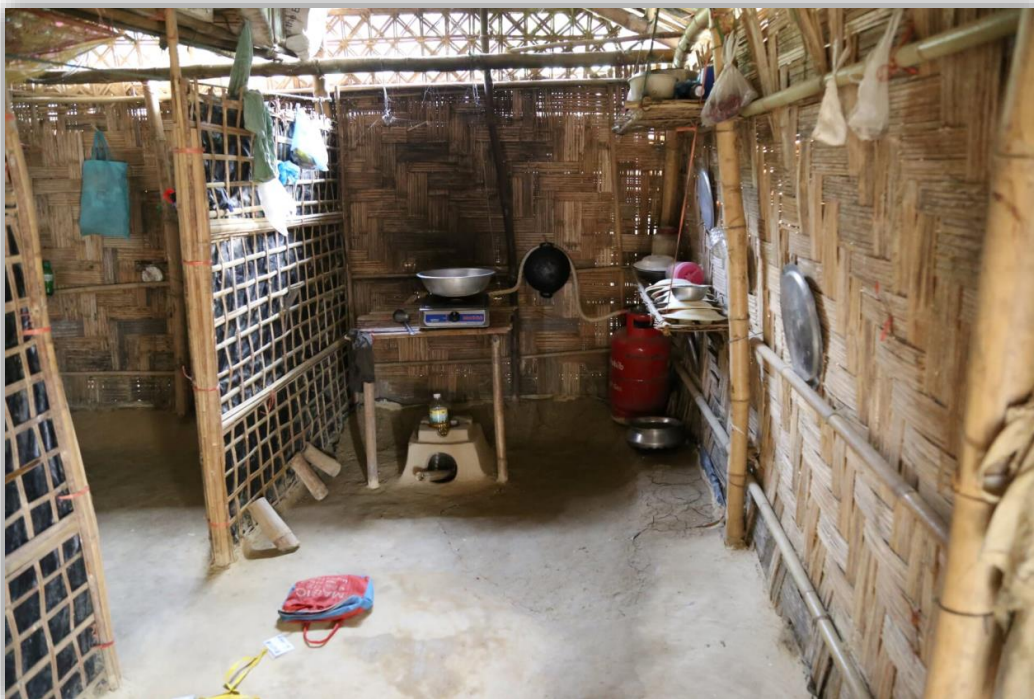

**Project Scope:**

OBAT Helpers, American Refugee Committee and Love Army, established in early April 2018, a tri-partite partnership to build 1000 shelters for the Rohingya refugees in and around Kutupalang camps near Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh.

Love Army raised the needed funding (630,000 USD), OBAT Helpers served as the implementation partner and ARC provided supportive technical and financial assistance. Refugee selection and site locations was determined through each camp's coordinating leadership.

Shelter design, approx. 25'x12' (300 SQFT) was determined before signed agreement. The design follows Sphere standards. There are some shelters, in Camp 8W, due to plot size that were constructed a bit smaller, but all met the Sphere standards for appropriate family size.

Over 1000 shelters have been completed, safely housing more than 5000 refugees. In the process of the project, the refugees were engaged to help in the development of their shelter plot. This involvement, as a basic component for successful community development, gave the families focus during a stressful time and exercised their own resilience.

The community has become strong and the families seem very satisfied with the care given during the construction of their shelters. If resources continued to be available for these families, it has been suggested that providing a cement floor and continued termite treatment as a follow-up stage would be good for the comfort and durability of their current shelter.

While the initial timeline for the project was too short, and ill-advised considering the capacity of the implementing partner. ARC has taken the additional steps, adding shelter and program specialists, to ensure that the shelters have been built to the standards and expectations of the funders.

Activities of OBAT Helpers for Rohingya People:

In the initial days of the crisis, OBAT addressed the emergency needs of the refugees through the following areas:

Providing families with emergency kits (dry food, first aid, sanitary and hygiene products, basic essentials like plastic cups and other daily use items). Providing freshly cooked baby food on a daily basis. Stationary medical camps with full time general physicians, pediatricians, OB/GYN specialists and therapists.

After the initial influx, we implemented the following programs:

- 100 learning centers planned for 10,000 kids- 26 built; digital learning center
- Nine bridges and twelve pathways
- Two medical centers running treating an average of 400 patients a day. Maternity section in progress; 40 bed 24 hours in-patient facility
- Edie's Community Kitchen serving 400 people
- Women's Sewing Project and Digital Learning Program
- Distribution of shelter kits, solar lights and meals
- Programs for host community (digital learning class and community outreach)
- 270 shelters built for Extremely Vulnerable Individuals
- Park for children
- Five mobile medical camps
- 78 tubewells are providing clean water
- 1,504 shelters have been built, providing families with secure and safe homes for the upcoming rainy and cyclone season
- Two community centers and one Women's Empowerment Center

**Project Framework:**

Primary objective of the project was to build bamboo made shelter houses for 1000 Rohingya refugee families who had to flee to Bangladesh from Rakhine State of Myanmar in order to find a safe and secure place due to humanitarian crisis in Myanmar.

Beneficiaries:

The beneficiary refugee families were selected according to the vulnerability criteria and with consultation with shelter sector and camp management.

The total beneficiaries from this project are 1043 families or 5215 individuals. All beneficiaries are forcefully displaced Rohingya refugees residing in the camps in Cox's Bazar.

Indirect Beneficiaries:

From the very beginning of the project, refugee population were engaged in the site clearing, land development and construction processes in the field level.

Rohingya refugees had access to income directly from field level by working in the construction phase of the entire project.

Implementation Process:

Implementation process includes the following steps:

- a. Needs assessment was conducted involving all stakeholders
- b. Selection of the beneficiaries were done
- c. Approvals were obtained from all relevant government agencies
- d. Quotations were collected from suppliers
- e. Construction materials were received and dispatched to the selected locations
- f. Construction of the shelter houses were completed
- g. Process documentation were in place



In 2018, Love Army generously donated \$760,899 USD to the projects of OBAT Helpers. Their donations benefitted, and are continuing to benefit, over 57,225 Rohingya refugees living in the Kutupalong refugee camp area in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh.

OBAT Helpers was responsible for the project, providing strategic support to the planning, implementation, monitoring and reporting within the specified time period.

The field office in Ukhiya, Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh has procured the required materials and were responsible for the project implementation in the Rohingya camps as per the contract.

Both OBAT Helpers and ARC staff members were directly involved in the monitoring and implementation process.

Conclusion:

Over 1043 shelters have been completed, safely housing more than 5215 refugees. In the process of the project, the refugees were engaged to help in the development of their shelter plot. This involvement, as a basic component for successful community development, gave the families focus during a stressful time and exercised their own resilience. The community has become strong and the families seem very satisfied with the care given during the construction of their shelters.

ARC, on the behalf of Love Army, oversaw the implementation of numerous projects with multiple like-minded partners whilst implementing unique and innovative projects of our own in the Rohingya camps. All of the projects were based on the principle of human-centered design – for the community, with the community – enabling them with the tools to uplift their own lives.

In addition to our work in Bangladesh, ARC has been working with displaced Rohingya communities inside of Myanmar since 2018 – providing primary health care support and relief for families. We have also been working in other areas of Myanmar with migrant and displaced communities since 2013.

PROJECT SUMMARY

The Rohingya people are one of the most persecuted minority groups in the world. As a result of discrimination and extreme violence against Rohingya people in Myanmar in August 2017, over 700,000 Rohingya crossed over the border into the Cox's Bazar district of Bangladesh.

The new arrivals joined some 200,000 other Rohingya who had left during earlier waves of violence and persecution in Myanmar. Most are living in fragile shelters in overcrowded settlements where they are vulnerable to the spread of disease. Over 908,000 had fled there by the end of 2018.

PROJECT OBJECTIVE

The primary objective of the project was to improve the water infrastructure and availability of clean, safe water to the refugees living in the Kutupalong unregistered camp.

Main Objectives:

- Provide clean, safe water for drinking, cooking, bathing and other household uses
- Complete a variety of other livelihoods and community development projects to bolster the resilience of the community

PROJECT BENEFICIARIES

Clean water had been a major challenge for people living in Kutupalong. Many water points had been broken and required repairs to again function and provide water to the community. There also were not a sufficient number of water points to satisfy the needs of the area and population following the huge influx of refugees in the latter part of 2017.

The lack of clean water affects everyone in the community, requiring that all residents spend additional time (and sometimes money) working to access all the water their families need on a daily basis. Water not available close to home also disproportionately affects vulnerable households that may be forced to undertake additional risk or unreasonable effort to satisfy their needs.

The establishment and rehabilitation of these 81 wells touched every member of the community, whether bringing water closer to home or just generally reducing the wait time at water points to get water (and freeing up time for other purposes).

In addition to direct beneficiaries, several dozen members of the Rohingya community benefited through employment in implementation of our efforts. The work crews drilling wells, repairing water taps, picking up garbage, and building shelters and benches – the direct economic benefit to these laborers of employment trickled from them to their families and greater community.

PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS

The implementation included the following primary steps:

- Starting with the people, sitting with regular folks and community leaders to understand the greatest needs and gaps in services they were experiencing; Needs assessment
- A mapping of existing water infrastructure – both functional and non-functional – and ideal locations for potential additional water assets
- Identifying of most vulnerable households in the community
- Required approvals from all necessary governmental and camp entities
- Hiring of refugee and host community staff to implement
- A bidding and quotation process for the competitive supply of all materials; selection of winning bidders by a committee
- Ongoing project coordination by members of the refugee and host communities
- Livelihoods Training
- Direct cash distribution to most vulnerable households and individuals
- Monitoring and assessment of work by members of the Rohingya refugee community

HELP Cox's Bazar is a pioneer NGO in this locality particularly only one Ukhiya based NGO registered with the department of social services under the Ministry of Social welfare in 2001 as well as affiliated in the NGO affairs Bureau under the Prime Minister Office in 2006. From the very inception to right now it crucially striving to uplift the rights for vulnerable & marginalized group specially women & children through undertaking & implementing different activities & programs. In line with this it has 18 years enriched & sound experiences to do work for the enhancement towards the rights of deprived people providing support. Recently due to huge influx of Rohingya people from Myanmar to in this area, from the beginning to right now HCB is disseminating message relating to GBV as well as trafficking through forming different committees in the blocks of the camps. On 25 August 2017, violence erupted in Rakhine State in southern Myanmar forcing (to-date) almost 1 million Rohingya people to flee to neighboring Bangladesh particularly 80% in UkhiyaUpazilla (Sub-Districts) under Cox's Bazar District contributing sever extent of sufferings not only for the forcibly displaced myanmar nation (FDMN). Genocide, atrocity& incidents like brutal killing, gang rape, put firing, major injury & forcing to ill-fated people to be moved here in Cox Bazar completely be considered more than the barbarian one as far remembering in the history civilized Glob creating devastating humanitarian crisis as well which needed unguent attention with a view to reducing the pain & pathetic moan of these segment of people as early as possible. Hence, to control potential overall devastating situation intensive support & awareness on WASH, Health care service & garbage cleaning of need based support like family kits distribution, health care support, & others to the FDMN especially towards women & children is crucial demand right now in the camps. In Southern Bangladesh (Cox's Bazar, Ukhiya&Teknaf), there are currently two official refugee camps, three makeshift camps and six spontaneous/unplanned camps. Impact Report:

Healthy Snacks programs:

A healthy snack program was designed for children attending our Moonlight Learning center for basic education. Rohingya Children were out of school since fled to Bangladesh and hanging out, loitering unnecessarily to pass time. We have initiated a temporary learning for these children to facilitate basic language, English and math to keep them growing. A healthy snack was provided to these students to maintain their nutrition and hydration level up enables children's learning process seamless. Students enjoyed the program so much. Daily rituals of washing hands before snacking, mild plays and exercise after the snack, sharing and helping others was a take on for them.

Hot Meal Kitchen:

Hot meal kitchen was kicked off to provide hot and healthy meals twice a day for the monsoon displaced rohingya refugees off their shelter and shifted to temp tents until their shelters were to re-build. They had no way of cooking where they were temporarily placed and continuous rain, mudslides made it even worse. Our emergency meals helped them get going and gradually shifted to new shelters. We continued feeding the school children and pregnant woman with smaller children a full meal during lunch time after that and soon enough there were few hundred victims of camp fire started benefitting from our kitchen. Daily hot and healthy meals to these families and students had helped them a lot in every aspect.

Ramadan Iftar Bag:

1500 iftar bags (dry foods) contained Ramadan iftar items to be cooked and consumed during Ramadan 2019. This program helped approx. 9000 members within the 1500 families during Ramadan fasting time.

Tree plantation :

A mixed of Fruits and wood 1000 trees have been planted for 500 families by their shelters as part of environment awareness, assuming responsibilities and taking part of the communities for the families

Over the past 17 years, Friendship has built a reputation as a reliable healthcare provider during major emergencies such as floods and cyclones. Friendship's innovative healthcare system and integrated service approach, coupled with a strong healthcare team in the Head Office and Field Offices, can provide timely delivery of reliable primary and secondary care services in the remotest of locations during major disasters (including flood-prone river islands and coastal areas). Friendship had started its intervention in the Rohingya camps from August, 2018 and has served over 700,000 people till date.

In 2017, **Love Army had generously donated EURO 105.968** to the projects of Friendship to construct and operate one unit of Basic Clinic and one unit of Child Friendly Space in the Rohingya camp.

The contribution enabled Friendship to carry out two projects:

1. Construction and operation of one basic clinic
2. Construction and operation of Child Friendly Space

1. Construction and Operation of Basic Clinic

This covered the area of Health, providing primary healthcare as well as counselling and referral services. With funding from Love Army, Friendship constructed and operated one basic clinic in the camps. Love Army's donations **helped render 15,660** services to people from the Rohingya community from October, 2017 to March, 2018.

2. Construction and Operation of Child Friendly Space

The contribution from Love Army was used to construct one unit of Child Friendly Space in the Rohingya camp, covering areas of Health, Education, WASH, and Nutrition. This donation was utilized to construct the center, to train the staff, to provide basic literacy skills, nutrition demonstration, provision of food supplements, referrals for primary healthcare services, and sensitization of the community members.
